NATIONAL OPIOID EDUCATION AWARENESS CAMPAIGN STARTED

On February 6, leading partners across healthcare, public health and the pharmaceutical supply chain joined together to launch <u>Allied Against Opioid Abuse (AAOA)</u>, a national education and awareness initiative to help combat the nation's opioid abuse epidemic. Read more here.

GOVERNORS GROUP LAUNCHES NEW OPIOID PROJECTS

Twelve states have been selected to participate in two projects the National Governors Association unveiled on February 6. The first focuses on Kentucky's efforts to address the increased risk of infectious disease through public health surveillance and community prevention efforts. DOJ will argue that the federal government has borne substantial costs because of the opioid

epidemic and should be reimbursed for health programs and law enforcement efforts to combat the crisis. Read more here.

On February 27, a bipartisan group of eight senators <u>introduced</u> a follow on to the 2016 Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act, dubbed CARA 2.0. The bill outlines plans for spending some of the \$6 billion in additional opioid funding in the congressional spending deal while proposing new policies addressing opioid prescribing.
